



Migration of professionals and paraprofessionals



Significant number of new and inexperienced paraprofessionals



Decreased accessibility of family-oriented services from state and communal providers



Lack of recognition of paraprofessionals on a state level



Lack of competencies



Burnout (36% of charity sector workers have visible signs, while 35% are in the stage of its formation)*



Key competencies of paraprofessionals working with families and children*

Core competencies in working with families and children

Knowledge of the legal framework and ability to work effectively as part of the child protection system

Ability to support families to ensure the protection and well-being of children in accordance with the strategies of the three-level model Ability to facilitate and maintain secure attachment between children and their families

Ability to develop and implement child placement plan in a manner that minimizes stress, prevents trauma, and supports placement stability and permanency Ability to identify and respond to cases of child abuse

Approaches to the work

- Family-oriented
- Trauma-sensitive
- Resilient

Key competencies of paraprofessionals working with families and children

Competencies in working with families and children in the context of ongoing war

Understanding of the nature of political violence in the conditions of war, its consequences at the level of the individual, family, community and state, and the ability to use this knowledge to organize assistance

Ability to provide psychological first

aid

Ability to deal with loss (of family, home, work, lifestyle)

Ability to build communication with veterans and their families, identify their needs and organize services accordingly

- "From risk to sustainability: work with families in crisis"

- "Organization and conducting of support groups"



Professional training and postgraduate qualification training in cooperation with educational institutions

Why are paraprofessionals critically important?

As a result of the war, Ukrainian society faced numerous social problems: poverty, internal and external displacement of families, law labor market, economic challenges, war trauma, children returning from orphanages to their biological families, etc.

The local government has limited resources to do their role.

Paraprofessionals can become a game changer to address families' needs and support the state in family-based care efforts.

Key Points

Recognise the unique role of paraprofessionals in the work with families and children in the community

Strengthen
paraprofessionals through
coordination, training,
prevention of burnout, etc

Create opportunities for the professionalisation of paraprofessionals to strengthen social work workforce Systematic, accessible professional training to develop professional competences that meets their needs is a main condition to the effectiveness of paraprofessional workforce
